Why breakfast?

Studies show students who eat breakfast...

- Have improved attendance and less tardiness
- Are able to pay attention longer
- Have better behavior in the classroom
- Perform better on tests
- Make fewer trips to the school nurse
- Have a better overall diet
- Are more likely to be at a healthy weight

Studies show that students who eat breakfast at school, closer to academic instruction and testing time, perform better on standardized tests than those who skip breakfast or eat breakfast at home.

Meals served as part of the School Breakfast Program provide one-fourth or more of the daily recommended levels for key nutrients that children need for growth and development.

Learning to make healthy food choices contributes to student success. School breakfast can make a difference in the lives of students.

What can school nurses do?

- Support school breakfast – students who eat breakfast do better in school.
- Make sure school staff, students and families know about school breakfast.
- Talk to teachers, other school staff and families about the benefits of breakfast.
- Encourage students to eat breakfast every day.
- Teach and role model healthy eating, including eating a healthy breakfast every day.
- Review the school breakfast menu with students and discuss healthy options.
- Eat school breakfast, spend time with the students and encourage school staff to eat school breakfast with students.
- Advocate for school breakfast to be included in the Local Wellness Policy.
- If you have questions about school breakfast, talk with your Child Nutrition director.
